


KAGAN Cooperative Learning at Halling Primary School.



What is Kagan?

- Kagan is a pedagogical (methods and theory) approach which focuses on developing a classroom culture of collaboration, support, success and celebration.
- It was developed following a research programme by Dr Spencer Kagan in 1968.



- The findings were that pupils of all ages respond with increased cooperativeness when put in certain situations.
- Dr Kagan began to look at ways these findings could be applied to classroom situations. He started to create structures that teachers could easily teach their pupils that would help the pupils to interact effectively.

Benefits found in Kagan.



- Greater academic achievement.
- Improved relationships between different groups of pupils.
- Enhanced self-esteem.
- Improved social skills.
- Harmonious classroom climate.







Kagan at Halling.

- All staff were initially trained with Kagan in September 2022 and we have been implementing it and developing it at school since then.
- Our Kagan leads, Mrs Nott and Mrs Reid, have had 3 additional days of training since this date and have been passing on further training and information to the rest of the staff.



 Kagan training runs three times a year across the trust for any new staff.

Why do we use Kagan at Halling?

To develop social skills and increase engagement and participation of all learners.

> To improve recall and memory.

To ensure each pupil is individually accountable and active in their learning.

To provide an alternative to hands up or worksheets. To develop spoken language and vocabulary acquisition.

To promote inclusivity, collaboration and kindness.




7 Key concepts in a Kagan classroom.

1. The four PIES principles of Kagan.



- 2. Teams of 4 where possible (this can be adapted to suit the number of children in the class).
- **3. Class building structures used to create a caring class community.**
- 4. Teambuilding structures which create strong teams of 4.
- 5. Good management of interaction through the use of tools and other strategies.
- 6. The development of social skills through the use of structures.
- 7. The structures themselves.
